TRANSLITERATION AND HONORIFIC GUIDE

The transliteration used in our books is to facilitate the pronunciation of Arabic words using Roman script for the ease and convenience of our readers. However, this is not meant to be a substitute for learning to properly read and pronounce Arabic script. Every Muslim should take it upon themselves to learn the rules of *tajwād* (proper Qur'ānic recitation) from a qualified teacher.

According to the convention used in our books:

-The Majestic Name, "Allah," does not take a diacritic.

-The *tā marbūtah* (5) that occurs at the end of some Arabic words is generally transliterated into English with an "h" at the end of the word, except when it comes in the names of people in which case it is dropped off.

-Arabic words transliterated into English are italicized except words that have been adopted into the English dictionary, commonly used words, and proper nouns.

-To make things easier for our readers, instead of using Arabic plurals, Arabic words are made plural by adding an "s" at the end of the singular word.

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ALFŪŻ LITERALLY MEANS AN UTTERANCE (pl. malfūżāt). In the terminology of the people of taṣawwuf it refers to the wise sayings of the shaykhs of the spiritual path. Students would often transcribe the words and lectures of their shaykhs and compile them into books. These malfūžāt or "wisdoms" would often be read in gatherings, and lessons would be delivered from them.

The earliest precedent for such collections is the memorization and transcription of the blessed words of our Beloved Prophet in the form of *hadīth*. Furthermore, as a supplement to the *hadīth* collections, narrators also preserved the words and anecdotes of the Prophet's companions and the pious predecessors that followed after them. For example, *muṣannafs* of Imām Ibn Abī Shayba and Imām 'Abd al-Razzāq contain hundreds of the *fatwās* (legal verdicts) and *malfūṣāt* of the Ṣaḥābah and Tābiʿūn.
